## **What is in this Toolkit**

This advocacy toolkit is a resource for library advocates and provides information on the Montgomery County budget process, contact information for decision makers, and strategies for how to engage them to ask for support of our FY 2022 budget priorities. Due to the pandemic, these approaches will be virtual. The toolkit is prepared by members of the Montgomery County Library Board and Friends of the Library, Montgomery County and is updated annually based on the budget climate, MCPL needs, and updated forms of communication.

This toolkit contains the following:

- Joint Position Paper on budget priorities.
- Suggested talking points.
- Information about the key people in the county's decision-making process.
- Information about the new budget procedures that the County will use for the budget and how these procedures affect what we need to do to gain support.
- Recommendations on near-term actions we all can take.

## **MCPL Usage during the Pandemic**

Library usage has changed across the country during the pandemic and the same holds true for Montgomery County. We believe our advocacy strategies can be best positioned when we educate decision makers on the relevance of libraries and how they have helped us cope in big and small ways during the public health crisis. To this end, we ask that you share how you use MCPL branches during the period since March 2020, using a short questionnaire that will be emailed to joint meeting participants. We will use this information in material we provide to the decision makers.

We also ask you to communicate this message with our elected officials as the FY 2022 budget process unfolds. Specifically, we are looking for people to testify via video or in writing to the County Executive and the County Council during their budget hearings in April.

## **Background**

Montgomery County Public Libraries (MCPL) has responded quickly to the COVID-19 crisis by assuring that its services continue even though public access to the library buildings is closed. In particular, last July MCPL implemented contactless pick-up of books. It also expanded and simplified its online services including access to e-books and other materials and enhanced online events such as Storytime as well as programs for teens, and adults.

Our joint position paper supports MCPL's efforts to respond to the crisis and points out that supporting library services is even more important in a time of isolation.

The following paper sets forth detailed discussion of these points.

## FOLMC and MCPL Board Position Paper (DRAFT)

Dear County Executive Elrich:

Friends of the Library, Montgomery County and the Montgomery County Library Board recognize the unique uncertainties you face from the pandemic as you formulate your Fiscal Year 2022 budget proposal. We also witness every day the uniquely sustaining role our libraries play for all of us in the county as we live through this pandemic.

Given these two factors we have one priority at this time:

*That you sustain funding for MCPL to enable it to continue operating at the manner and level it has achieved through its rigorous and imaginative reorganization of its services and resources.*

MCPL's services have become critical in our enduring isolation. They are vital to our cultural, social, and economic health and our psychological wellbeing. Despite having to close its doors in March, our MCPL leadership has devised new ways to serve us. It greatly expanded digital offerings and made them easier to access on tablets, e-readers, phones, and computers. Readers can also pick-up physical books curbside through online or telephone reservations.

From March through mid-November, MCPL has circulated almost 2.7 million newly borrowed physical and electronic items while renewing more than 900,000 items. Montgomery County residents, your constituents, clearly want and need these services.

In addition, MCPL has shifted many of its programs, such as Storytime, to interactive, virtual presentations. It has also maintained its telephone reference services that provide the public with access to professional library services, particularly for those without online access.

MCPL has made significant efforts to alleviate the Digital Divide. Library parking lots have become well-used Wi-Fi hotspots and the system created "Internet to Go," a lending program for 250 mobile hotspots.

These internet initiatives are yet another aspect of how our libraires promote racial and social equity; all its resources and programs are available to everyone. And finally, with all their early childhood literacy programs, our libraries attack the biggest engine of inequity in the county--lack of kindergarten readiness--a condition that you have identified vividly as our county's number one pre-pandemic priority.

As a result of these efforts Montgomery County Public Libraries remains a mainstay of life in our beleaguered county. We strongly urge that you do your utmost to protect and nurture this vibrant institution and its vital services.

## What can you do between now and March 15?

The County Executive and his staff are now considering his March 15 budget presentation to the County Council. In view of the current situation, it will be difficult to interact personally with members of the Montgomery County Council and other Montgomery County decision makers.

You can, however, do the following:

Call, send a letter, email, or post on social media based on the joint position paper and your own experience with our libraries (especially during the pandemic) to one or more of the decision makers listed below and, if you can, get two other people to do the same. Prior to March 15, County Executive Elrich is the first priority, but communications with Council members are also valuable. It will be even more so when Mr. Elrich's budget proposal is in their hands after March 15.

In that communication, please:

- Include the priorities noted in the joint position paper or use the talking points below.
- Describe how you, or people you know, have used MCPL services during the current crisis.
- In your own words, say why you think it is important to continue support for the MCPL.
- Include pictures if you have them.

After March 15, action will move to the Council. As in years past, the Council will seek testimony from Montgomery County residents. In normal times several hundred people sign up to testify over several days of hearings and others submit written testimony for the record. This year, as with last year, oral testimony will probably be a virtual process and as soon as we know the procedures, we will communicate them and ask you to testify either virtually or in writing.

## Social Media

As advocates, we can increase our impact through using social media in ways that emails and phone calls can't. ### Quick Tips

- All of the County Council members and County Executive are on social media and use it.
- **“Like”** or **“follow”** the Council members, and regularly interact with them.
- In all social media platforms (e.g., Facebook, Instagram, Twitter) you can share your thoughts with them.
- **“Tag”** @FOLMC (On Facebook and Twitter) @FOLMCMD (Instagram) and @MontgomeryCountyPublicLibraries (Facebook) @MCPL\_Libraries (Twitter and Instagram). Tagging is important because it amplifies your voice.
- As you post, your followers will also be encouraged to contact county leaders, too.

**Useful Talking and Writing Points:**

- We are proud of our libraries.
- We should be particularly proud of how MCPL responded to the physical shut down COVID-19 imposed. MCPL moved immediately to expand their digital resources and make them more available.
- MCPL made its programs and events available online.
- Patrons can click into well-loved Storytime sessions every day of the week.
- MCPL developed a no-contact, curbside pick-up service for physical books.
- Helpful, trained librarians still answer questions by internet or phone.
- MCPL expanded its Wi-Fi availability.
- Tens of thousands of Montgomery County residents have responded to these new lifelines for the well-being and balance libraries offer.
- that our library leadership created in record time.
- Tell County Executive Elrich that you are encouraged that he has pledged every effort to maintain our libraries funding in the upcoming budget.
- We need our libraries strong for the fear and isolation still ahead. And, libraries will help us with the information and resources we need to recover.
